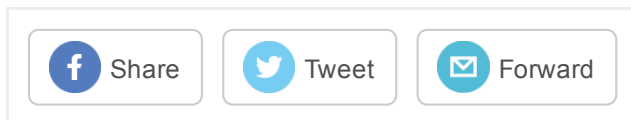

TIPS FOR MAKING YOUR HOME AND NEIGHBORHOOD SAFER

To help keep your house from being broken into, you must make yourself a "hard target." "Target Hardening" focuses on the concept that criminals often seek an easy target to prey on. If you make yourself a hard target, the criminal will simply move to a more vulnerable victim. Criminals like easy targets which minimizes the likelihood of being detected and/or caught. The more of an obstacle you present, the more likely a potential burglar will pick another house to break in to.

Doors and Windows

One of the simplest things you can do is lock your doors. Did you know a good portion of home burglaries occur because there was a door or window left open? Burglars commonly use unlocked rear doors, open bathroom windows and unsecured garage service doors to enter your house. By keeping the doors and windows to your residence locked, you dramatically reduce the likelihood of becoming a victim. Lock your doors even if you leave the house for only a moment. A brief trip would give a skilled burglar enough time to make his way through your house.

Alarm Systems

Security or Alarm Systems do have a place in preventing crime and if used effectively can assist in securing one's personal belongings. An alarm system, however, is not a cure for all people. Be careful in choosing which alarm system or company you purchase or do business with.

When you go on vacation

- Stop all deliveries including U.S Mail, the newspaper and advertisements.
- Salt Lake City residents can call (801) 799-3000 and request a patrol check on their home for the time period they will be gone.

Environmental Design

Crime prevention is more than simply making it inconvenient for a burglar to commit crime. Though target hardening is an effective approach, Environmental Design can assist in our overall goal of preventing crime.

1. A little lighting goes a long way. Make sure your street lights are in good working order. Place lights in your driveway and at your property boundaries. Make sure you have spot lights and motion sensitive lights on or near your house.
2. Trim back all shrubs and bushes. Keep your windows clear of trees and shrubbery.
3. Keep your yard tidy. Pick up trash cans as soon as possible. Make sure your house number is clearly visible.

Other Tips

- Keep accurate and up to date records of personal property to include model and serial numbers. (many thieves are caught when they try to sell the property and we have this information). Use the attached sheet and keep it in a locked safe or secured location.
- Take photos of all valuables and keep the photos on a CD or flash drive away from your computer, and consider having expensive items engraved or marked in some way.

WHY IS LEAD HARMFUL?

- Lead causes health, behavior, and learning problems especially for children under 6 years of age.
- Continued exposure can result in permanent injury.
- Lead harms unborn babies and pregnant mothers.

WHERE ARE LEAD HAZARDS FOUND?

- Interior or exterior painted surfaces that are chipping, or peeling, and friction surfaces like windows and doors.
- Dust, bare soil, vermin, water, and plastic mini-tanks.
- Homes built before 1978 may contain lead based paint; homes built before 1950 are at higher risk.

PROTECT YOUR FAMILY!

- Apply for the Lead Safe Housing Program's free services
- Get your child tested for lead poisoning (testing done by finger prick)
- Have your home tested for lead or ask your landlord about lead in your home (if built prior to 1978)
- Have your child wash their hands often
- Keep areas where children play dust-free and clean
- Mop floor, wipe window ledges and chewable surfaces with all purpose cleaner and warm water
- Encourage children to play in grassy areas instead of in the dirt which could contain lead

- El Plomo causa problemas de salud, comportamiento y aprendizaje especialmente a los niños menores de 6 años de edad.
- El continuo contacto con plomo puede resultar en daños permanentes.
- El Plomo afecta a los bebés por nacer y a las mujeres embarazadas.

¿DÓNDE SE ENCUENTRAN LOS PELIGROS DEL PLOMO?

- Sobre el interior y exterior de las ventanas y puertas que muestran pintura deteriorada.
- En el polvo, tierra, barro, agua, y superficies de plástico.
- Viviendas construidas antes de 1978 pueden tener pintura a base de plomo. Casas construidas antes de 1950 están en alto riesgo.

PROTEJA A SU FAMILIA!

- Solicite para servicios gratuitos Libre de Plomo en Salt Lake
- Lleve a su niño/a que se le haga la prueba de Plomo o pídale que alguien con un pedazo de cinta blanca.
- Han hecho la prueba de plomo en su casa o ha preguntado al dueño acerca del plomo en su casa (construida antes de 1978)
- El niño/a debe bañarse las manos con frecuencia
- Mantenga las áreas donde los niños juegan libre de polvo y tierra
- Mantenga las pintas, las rejillas de las ventanas, y objetos metálicos limpios, libres de pintura en uso raspado y agua fría
- Evite que los niños jueguen en lugares sin tierra o polvo. La tierra puede tener plomo.
