FROM THE DIRECTOR

June 17th, 2024, marked the 142nd year of Salt Lake City Parks. The first major public park in Salt Lake City was dedicated in 1882 as Liberty Park, making that the year the city began to care for and maintain its parks.

I'm grateful to live in and serve a city that consistently prioritizes parks. I have deep respect for our long-standing tradition of resource stewardship and community building, which involves our volunteers, stakeholders, staff, and residents.

This year has highlighted the challenges of maintaining our ball fields, medians, and parks as we faced the annual spring surge in park use, with increasing overnight camping, and rising incidents of vandalism and theft. Our teams work tirelessly, often putting in extra hours, to catch up once the snow melts and the grass begins to grow. Clearing trash, repairing vandalized sprinkler heads, and reinstalling copper wire day after day is no easy task, but our dedicated teams rise to the challenge. This dedication to care is evident daily through the efforts of our parks staff and the community volunteers who lend a helping hand.

In 2024, we successfully organized over 60 volunteer events, spanning from large community initiatives to smaller, targeted stewardship projects. These events attracted hundreds of committed volunteers, helping us enhance our public green spaces by reducing invasive plants and fostering connections between communities and nature.

This year, we've dedicated ourselves to listening closely. When voters passed the 2022 GO Bond, we promised to hear their ideas, needs, and aspirations for their neighborhood parks. The PL Planning Team, along with our Community Engagement Manager, has honored that promise by facilitating engagement at several parks.

In keeping with the legacy of our park system, we're committed to looking beyond today and planning for tomorrow. We are developing two new parks to expand our system and alleviate pressure on existing ones as our city's population grows. We're also fulfilling our long-standing promise to improve Pioneer Park, our only downtown park, after nearly two decades of discussions about necessary enhancements. Additionally, we are envisioning a revitalized future for our city river by focusing on restoring the riverbanks, and creating a welcoming, safe corridor for all who visit. Thank you to the residents of Salt Lake City, stakeholders and the Public Lands team for your care for the places that bring us all together.

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SUSTAIN: ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH AND SUSTAINABILITY

Public Lands will continue to be on the forefront of environmentalism, employing sustainable operations practices such as conserving water resources for greater resilience to climate change and making significant contributions to an equitable and healthier natural environment such as increasing tree cover that improves regional air quality and provides bird habitat.

PARKS

- Continued to prioritize sustainability by utilizing a fleet of six electric mowers and dozens of battery-powered tools to maintain parks while reducing air pollution.
- Finalized the installation of WeatherTrak irrigation controls across all parks, enabling real-time monitoring and management via mobile devices to improve water efficiency, detect leaks, and streamline maintenance.
- Collaborated with agriscience experts from Brigham Young University and Utah State University to evaluate and procure water-saving turf varieties for test plots, supporting future turf improvements in city parks.
- Maintained a hybrid garden pilot program at City-County Building Horseshoe with native water-wise and traditional plant species.

CEMETERY

- Adopted electric tools and upgraded irrigation systems to WeatherTrak technology, providing efficient water management that adjusts to weather patterns, prevents leaks, and minimizes waste.
- Initiated a roadway and irrigation project to modernize infrastructure, improve targeted tree irrigation, and reduce system inefficiencies.

REGIONAL ATHLETIC COMPLEX

- Treated retention ponds by cutting and spraying phragmites, significantly reducing invasive growth. Plans are in place to establish native vegetation once phragmites are eradicated.

TRAILS & NATURAL LANDS

- Hired the first full-time Restoration Ecologist and vegetation/trail maintenance staff for the Salt Lake City Foothills, boosting the division's sustainable restoration and upkeep capacity.
- Developed operations and maintenance plans for key natural lands, ensuring work aligned with goals and management objectives.
- Trained staff in noxious weed management and implemented updated practices to reduce herbicide use on natural lands.
- Established partnerships with the Utah Division of Forestry, Fire, and State Lands and the State of Utah to improve weed control and manage debris along the Jordan River, leveraging \$150,000 in state funding to enhance river health.

PARK RANGERS

- Supported tree health across parks by assisting with watering efforts and promptly reporting irrigation maintenance issues to reduce resource waste and maximize efficiency.



PLANNING & DESIGN

- A member of our team led policy development as the co-chair of the City's Sustainable Infrastructure Committee, resulting in new citywide standards requiring SITES certification for all public lands capital projects with construction budgets of \$2 million or more.
- Set a goal in the Emerald Ribbon Action Plan to restore 30% of the Jordan River corridor by converting invasive species to native plants enhancing ecosystem services.
- Designed new park projects, including the Liberty Park Rotary Playground and multiple smaller parks, incorporating water-wise landscaping to conserve resources and increase resilience to climate variability.

GOLF

- Upgraded irrigation controllers at Glendale, Mountain Dell, and Forest Dale courses and replaced pumps at Glendale.
- Allocated \$1,853,569 for cart path repairs and continued tee box leveling projects across multiple courses, enhancing playability and sustainability.

URBAN FORESTRY

- Organized and conducted the largest one-day volunteer tree-planting event in recent City history, hosting more than 200 volunteers at the Regional Athletic Complex to plant 279 new trees.
- Planted more than 1,000 new westside neighborhood trees (and more than 1,800 trees, citywide) for the 5th straight year.
- Expanded the Mark Smith Memorial Arboretum (at the Salt Lake City Cemetery) to 111 distinct species, making the collection eligible for Tier 2 status.
- Diverted 90% of tree and tree pruning wood to be processed into mulch and provided five deliveries of urban wood to the Hogle Zoo to be used in exhibits and for animal browse.
- Transitioned to a multiple contractor 'task order' based tree pruning program to increase the efficiency and quality control of contracted tree work.



CONNECT: ACCESSIBLE AND CONNECTED GREEN SPACES

Well-maintained, welcoming trails, streets, public transportation, and sidewalks are interconnected as the city's circulatory system. This system connects pedestrians, cyclists, and riders to the city's green spaces and outstanding natural landscapes. We will continue to enhance these systems and increase connectors to include everyday destinations ranging from the daycare, library, grocery store, pharmacy and museum.

PARKS

- Formalized a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the University of Utah to use their greenhouse, addressing the temporary inability to use the Liberty Park Greenhouse.
- Completed five bridge re-decking and reinforcement projects along the Jordan River Trail, improving safety and accessibility; the project remains ongoing.
- Planted over 200 new trees at the Regional Athletic Complex (RAC) on Earth Day.
- Collaborated with Planning, Communications, and Park Rangers to inventory and standardize park signage, improving existing assets and exploring outreach signage for areas with common homelessness concerns.
- Incorporated detour, wayfinding, and project information signs as part of ongoing park projects, ensuring the public stays informed.

REGIONAL ATHLETIC COMPLEX

- Hosted a 191-day season, with 8,835.5 reservation hours, 4,418 games played, and an average of 552 hours per field during the season.
- Generated \$606,019 in reservation revenue and an economic impact of \$18.4 million from 18 out-of-state events.
- Welcomed over 200,000 visitors and represented teams from 37 states.
- Organized 44 tournaments and events.

CEMETERY

- Successfully launched Spatial Generations, a public-facing, cloud-based platform that modernizes the Cemetery's plot ownership and burial records database.
- Partnered with the Information Management Systems department to migrate records and make burial data accessible through the Cemetery website, featuring tools such as wayfinding, photo uploads, and headstone images.

URBAN FORESTRY

- Conducted five walking tree tours for interested groups at city parks.
- Expanded Keep Your Cool campaign outreach, distributing new swag and engaging residents with tree care information at 20+ city events.
- Delivered seven presentations, participated in four panel discussions, and one podcast to elevate tree knowledge and awareness in northern Utah.

TRAILS & NATURAL LANDS

- Finalized Phase II of the Fairmont Stream Restoration, including interpretive signage that highlights the benefits of stream restoration and native plantings, in collaboration with Friends of Fairmont Park.
- Advanced the Be WILD Campaign, promoting responsible public lands stewardship and increasing user education.



PARK RANGERS

- Delivered 61 public programs attended by 1,844 individuals through September 2024.
- Conducted homeless outreach.
- Developed new educational materials for park users and specific programs.
- Launched the Be WILD Campaign in collaboration with Trails & Natural Lands and Communications to foster a culture of stewardship and inclusivity.
- Continued training Rangers in de-escalation techniques and participated in citywide Homeless Services meetings.

GOLF

- Expanded free practice areas across all courses, adding new bunkers at Forest Dale, Bonneville, and Rose Park to support golfers of all skill levels.
- Conducted 82 Junior Golf Clinics with 1,038 participants and 57 Adult Golf Clinics with 396 participants, including 30 women-only clinics with 240 participants.
- Continued planning for the replacement of the Rose Park Golf Course irrigation system, including removing 25% of irrigated turf for more sustainable landscaping.

PLANNING & DESIGN

- Finalized Phase II design for bilingual park signage (English and Spanish), with 20 parks receiving update signage by the end of 2025. New signs will include orientation maps for the parks that do not currently have them.
- Conducted workshops in Westside neighborhoods to gather input for the Emerald Ribbon Action Plan, with high-priority project designs starting in 2025.



WELCOME: ACTIVE, AUTHENTIC AND INCLUSIVE SPACES

Ideal parks are actively used by the community, inclusive for all ages, abilities and cultures and strive to be authentic, or reflective of the neighborhood and community's culture. We are committed to looking at top-down and bottom-up community-driven solutions to welcoming more people and will strive to reflect the diverse culture and history of our neighborhoods in the tapestry of parks and open spaces.

PARKS

- Provided input on citywide projects, including pickleball rule updates, tennis court conversions, and the Green Loop and Emerald Ribbon maintenance plans.
- Installed the new Taufer Park Playground in collaboration with KABOOM!, Delta Airlines, and the Utah Jazz, combining community design sessions and build days for a successful reopening.
- Supported RDA and city planners with insights for current and future ballpark initiatives, ensuring alignment with the city's vision.
- Expanded trash patrols along the Cottonwood and Jordan River Trail (JRT) to address issues of homelessness-related debris and vandalism.

CEMETERY

- Redesigned the Cemetery office to create a more welcoming and comfortable environment for families seeking information or scheduling burials.
- Contracted for installing lights on the first "Tree of Life" near the Sexton Office, creating a festive display to enhance the holiday season at the Cemetery.

REGIONAL ATHLETIC COMPLEX

- Hosted the Refugee Foster Care Program in partnership with Catholic Community Services, engaging 75 youth, foster parents, and staff in a meaningful event.
- Held three free Real Salt Lake youth camps, with over 80 campers attending each session, providing opportunities for skill development and recreation.

- Hosted the Monster Block Party, now in its third year, as a beloved annual community event for the west side.
- Completed design for the RAC Playground, with equipment ordered and construction scheduled for Spring 2025.

PARK RANGERS

- Expanded programs and tours to activate underutilized spaces and engage visitors in significant parks, hosting 114 tour attendees and 303 hours of event support through September 2024.
- Strengthened partnerships with SLC Public Schools, the Utah Museum of Natural History, Tracy Aviary, and others to broaden educational and stewardship opportunities.
- Collaborated with the Utah Cultural Stewardship Society and the State History Preservation Office to improve monitoring and reporting of culturally significant sites and public art.
- Supported Public Lands events such as Yappy Hours, July Holidays, Yoga in the Park, and Fall Dog Trainings, enhancing event experiences through staffing and stewardship.

STEWARDSHIP

- Hosted thousands of volunteers supporting 60+ events, including Earth Day clean-ups, RAC Tree Planting (250 trees), invasive weed removal, native habitat restoration (32,000 seedlings), and ongoing stewardship efforts like Jordan River Trail and Foothills maintenance.

PLANNING & DESIGN

- Hosted a grand opening for the newly-renovated Liberty Park Basketball Court, transforming it into a vibrant community space with a public art mural, new amenities, and improved infrastructure.
- Opened the city's first free-pick orchard at the 9-Line Orchard at Hayes Avenue between Glendale Street and 1100 West, in partnership with Tree Utah, with Parkview Elementary students participating in tree planting.
- In collaboration with the Public Utilities Department, completed Rosewood Park's eight lighted pickleball courts, the largest complex in the city and the first on the west side, addressing the growing demand for recreational amenities.
- Prioritized community input by researching historical archives, conducting public meetings, and infusing park designs with the unique identities of their neighborhoods.
- Facilitated opportunities for art, recreation, and public involvement at numerous community events to help residents shape the future of their parks.
- Held a ribbon cutting and completed final construction items for Marmalade Plaza near 500 North and 300 West, providing public open space to the Marmalade neighborhood, library patrons, and residents of immediately adjacent multi-family homes.

GOLF

- Expanded free practice areas across all courses, adding new bunkers at Forest Dale, Bonneville, and Rose Park to support golfers of all skill levels.
- Conducted 82 Junior Golf Clinics with 1,038 participants and 57 Adult Golf Clinics with 396 participants, including 30 women-only clinics with 240 participants.
- Continued planning for the replacement of the Rose Park Golf Course irrigation system, including removing 25% of irrigated turf for more sustainable landscaping.

TRAILS & NATURAL LANDS

- Strengthened sustainable trail and natural land management by collecting usage patterns and planning improvements to enhance user experience and ecosystem health.

EVENTS

- Hosted 16 unique events across 49 activation days, engaging 37,500 attendees and partnering with 200+ vendors to enhance offerings and support local businesses.



PROTECT: A COMMITMENT TO STEWARDSHIP

The Public Lands Department will balance providing safe green spaces for the public while also protecting iconic, irreplaceable natural resources that keep the city wild. The Department will lead the stewardship and care of urban green spaces and seek out opportunities to partner with advocacy groups and schools to educate on how the public can be stewards of the land and learn its history.

PARKS

- Partnered with diverse community groups, including the International Peace Gardens Committee, Coach Mike's Tennis Foundation, Rotary Club, neighborhood organizations, community baseball leagues, and "Friends of" organizations. These collaborations have strengthened community stewardship and advanced Parks' mission to maintain vibrant public spaces.
- Finalized restoration work at Wasatch Hollow, stabilizing the hillside and repairing flood-damaged infrastructure.
- Engaged over 150 volunteers in the annual Memory Grove cleanup, demonstrating strong community involvement.
- Restored and protected historic elements in parks, including the artesian wells at Liberty Park, masonry fireplaces at Liberty Park, and reinvigorated historic planters at Liberty Park's north entrance.
- Supported the International Peace Gardens Committee in achieving RCO and 501(c)(3) status while contributing to the success of the 2024 Peace Gardens Festival.
- Collaborated with Wasatch Community Gardens to launch the "Green Phoenix Farm" near the Sorensen Center, providing essential infrastructure for its success.

CEMETERY

- Partnered with Friends of the Salt Lake City Cemetery to enhance the grounds through tree planting events, guided tours, and a successful post-Memorial Day cleanup.
- Supported a volunteer-led initiative focused on repairing and realigning historic headstones in the Cemetery's Japanese section.

TRAILS & NATURAL LANDS

- Completed the Rotary Glen Restoration, installing fencing and native plants to preserve woodland habitat near the off-leash dog park to enhance safety and ecological health.
- Transformed the Cornell Wetlands into a demonstration site for native plantings and storm water management, highlighting riparian restoration efforts along the Jordan River.
- Partnered with the Salt Lake City School District to reduce illegal activities at the East Bench Preserve and H-Rock and initiated restoration planning for 2025.
- Upgraded irrigation at Hidden Hollow to reduce water use, improve natural habitat, and ensure safety at this urban oasis.
- Restored Blaine Preserve after Spring 2023 flooding, stabilizing stream banks and planting 500 riparian plants to revitalize the area.

PARK RANGERS

- Introduced a comprehensive Standard Operating Procedures manual to standardize operations and increase accountability.
- Achieved certifications for all Rangers as Interpretive Guides through the National Association of Interpretation, ensuring professional program delivery.
- Through September 2024, Rangers achieved:
 - 7,694 patrol hours
 - 49,929 public greetings
 - 4,051 educational interactions about the program
 - 2,371 dog bag refills
 - 3,016 buckets of litter collected
 - 457 graffiti incidents addressed

URBAN FORESTRY

- Converted an Office Tech position to an additional Service Coordination Arborist position to increase development plan review and inspection capacity by 100%.
- Established a new robust tree mitigation appraisal protocol to ensure that the actual value of mature trees is mitigated when development necessitates tree removal.
- Responded to and mitigated 101 tree-related emergencies in the interest of public safety.

PLANNING & DESIGN

- Secured water slides from the former Raging Waters/Seven Peaks water park for reuse as a new placemaking feature in Glendale Park, blending sustainability with creative design.
- Advanced the International Peace Gardens' CIP-funded project, completing art restoration and making significant progress on new plantings and structural renovations to preserve this cultural landmark.
- Partnered with Engineering to finalize designs for stabilizing the Fisher Mansion, with construction estimated to begin in 2025. Also initiated a visioning process for its future use.
- Hosted open houses and public events to gather input on park designs, strengthening community involvement and encouraging stewardship.
- Completed the repair of outdoor court #7 at the

- Completed and presented to the City Council about the Allen Park Adaptive Reuse and Management Plan, which will guide GO Bond-funded and other improvements to Allen Park, which the City acquired and opened in 2020.
- Began developing the Strategic Capital, Acquisition, and Asset Management Plan (SCAAMP) to maximize the impact of funding and ensure the long-term care of public assets.

GOLF

- Made significant progress on deferred maintenance, including irrigation system upgrades, cart path repairs, tee box leveling, and clubhouse improvements.
- Invested \$1,853,569 in cart path repairs at multiple courses, with Bonneville scheduled for Spring 2025.
- Completed the second year of a four-year tee box leveling project at all City golf courses.
- Replaced the clubhouse and maintenance building roofs and rebuilt the clubhouse deck at Mountain Dell.
- Purchased \$838,997 in new equipment to improve course maintenance and operations.
- Introduced new golf car fleets at Rose Park and Forest Dale, enhancing player experience and sustainability.



GROW: EXPAND OUR PUBLIC LANDS SYSTEM

City departments and partners work together to provide green space and recreation opportunities in our rapidly re-developing downtown. We innovate and make smart use of the public properties we have, being strategic with our resources and creating funding sources to expand our urban forest, trails, park system, and natural areas.

PARKS

- Completed the Lindsey Gardens project, which includes an ADA-accessible walkway, a new batting cage, and a refurbished concession stand.

TRAILS & NATURAL LANDS

- Began construction on four Foothills trailhead locations to improve access and accessibility to Salt Lake City's foothills natural area.
- Expanded the Native Plant Program by producing over 50,000 native plants in partnership with the University of Utah, Utah State University, and the Utah State Department of Corrections and planted over 30,000 native plants on Public Lands in Fall 2024.

REGIONAL ATHLETIC COMPLEX

- Completed the Rose Park Lane house demolition, clearing, and fencing of the site for future improvement opportunities.
- Completed design for the RAC Playground, with equipment ordered and construction scheduled for Spring 2025.

CEMETERY

- Partnered with Friends of the Salt Lake City Cemetery to enhance the grounds through tree planting events, guided tours, and a successful post-Memorial Day cleanup.
- Supported a volunteer-led initiative focused on repairing and realigning historic headstones in the Cemetery's Japanese section.



URBAN FORESTRY

- Coordinated six volunteer tree planting events with local non-profit, Tree Utah, in city parks.
- Organized and conducted the largest one-day volunteer tree planting event in recent City history, hosting more than 200 volunteers at the Regional Athletic Complex to plant 279 new trees.
- Successfully transitioned to an 'all-dormant' tree planting program to reduce planting stress, improve establishment success, and free up service response capacity in spring and fall.

PARK RANGERS

- Expanded Park Ranger coverage to seven days a week, ten hours daily, ensuring greater public safety, enhanced professionalism, and reliable public engagement.
- Park Rangers partnered with the Library system to lead fourteen programs this year at various branches. Seven of those programs were part of their summer adventure series.

PLANNING & DESIGN

- Began construction on Glendale Park, Utah's first SITES-certified project, setting a benchmark for sustainable public lands development.
- Allocated \$18M in parks impact fees to acquire property, add amenities, and enhance park services, improving accessibility to public lands and helping to maintain park level of service for existing and future Salt Lakers.
- Co-led an interdepartmental campaign to redevelop the Fleet Block in the Granary District. This effort engages stakeholders to shape the vision for a 3-acre public open space, with a design and community engagement team established in late 2024.
- Completed the community garden at the Rose Park Neighborhood Center in partnership with Wasatch Community Gardens, increasing biodiversity, access to food, and community connections.

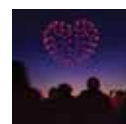

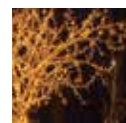
