SUBJECT: UPDATED: Overview of Ranked Choice Voting and Participation in the Municipal

Alternative Voting Method Pilot Program

IMPORTANT DATES: (Current legislation impact to previously provided information is in italics)

- **Before April 15, 2021:** Notice to Lt. Governor stating intention to participate in the Pilot Program and assurance the municipality has the resources and capability to participate.
 - o If H.B. 75 passes as it is currently written, the legislative body must provide this notice to the Lt. Governor as well as to the Salt Lake County Clerk, after voting to participate. The Recorder's Office will no longer be able to provide the notice.
 - Additionally, if H.B. 174 passes as it is currently written, the municipality must also notify the Lieutenant Governor of which voting method (Ranked Choice, Approval or Star) they intend to use within the same notification.
- Tuesday, November 2, 2021: Municipal General Election
 - o Primary election is optional under the State's defined pilot program

BUDGET IMPACT: Impact to the City may be directly linked to an interlocal agreement with County election services (no current estimate) or may be direct on behalf of the City Recorder's office budget. The budget impact will be determined by the services offered through County election services and the decision of City elected officials.

• If H.B. 75 passes as it is currently written, Salt Lake County will be required by the statute to run the election, the County will no longer have allowance to deny the option to interested municipalities.

DISCUSSION: Ranked Choice Voting—also known as Instant Runoff Voting—is used for single-winner elected positions. The practice was used in the 2019 Municipal Elections for Utah cities Vineyard and Payson. Feedback from the experience in Utah County was generally positive. The potential of Salt Lake City participating in the Pilot program includes the need to discuss the process, how the elections would be conducted and educational efforts.

Ranked Choice Voting Guiding Principles

- Winner declared with more than 50% of the vote
- Decreased splitting of the vote ("lesser of two evils" approach); voters may select candidates they like in preferential order, not simply vote against the candidate with whom the voter disagrees.
- Decreased election costs (due to the removal of the Primary)
- Potentially greater representation of diverse community members

Ranked Choice Voting Process

- 1) Ballots are designed to list all candidates for the respective position with a designated table area for ranking candidates in order of preference. (Please see Exhibits A & B for sample ballot layout)
- 2) Voters rank the candidates in order of preference
- 3) Election equipment tabulates the preference numbers for each ballot
- 4) If none of the candidates receive more than 50% of the overall vote, the candidate with the least number of votes is eliminated, and those who had that candidate selected as their first choice will now have their votes counted for the candidate they chose as second. This process of elimination continues until a candidate crosses the 50% threshold and is declared the winner.

RANKED CHOICE VOTING PROCESS IF H.B. 127 PASSES:

- 1. If H.B. 127 passes as it is currently written, voters will have to indicate who their first preference is and then may indicate:
 - a. The names of the remaining candidates in order of the voter's preference, if there are five candidates or less,
 - b. Or, the names of up to four of the remaining candidates in order of the voter's preference, if there are six candidates or more (totaling five candidates ranked).
 - c. If there is a tie-vote while using ranked choice voting, that tie will have to be broken by lot.
 - d. With this legislation, a new form of batch elimination outlines how the election official must eliminate candidates when counting. This means that if the election official chooses to use Batch Elimination, they may exclude each candidate where:
 - i. The number of remaining candidates with more valid votes is greater than or equal to the number of remaining spots, and;
 - ii. The number of valid votes counted for the candidate in the phase plus the number of votes counted for all candidates with fewer valid votes is less than the number of valid votes for the candidate with the next highest amount in the phase.

RANKED CHOICE VOTING PROCESS IF H.B. 174 PASSES:

- 1. If H.B. 174 passes as it is currently written, there will be two new RCV methods, the approval method and star method. The municipality can choose which method it prefers.
 - a. The approval method requires voters to indicate which candidates they approve of, there is no order or ranking. Example: If the voter has three candidates on the ballot and they only approve of two, they need only mark those two. Then the candidates are ranked by who received the most approvals and the candidate with the most wins. If there is a tie it is broken by lot.
 - b. The star method requires voters to indicate how many stars (out of five five being the highest) they would give each candidate on the ballot. Example: If the voter has the same three candidates as before and they give Candidate #1 five stars, Candidate #2 three stars, and Candidate #3 zero stars, Candidate #1 would win as they had the most stars. The candidate with the most stars overall wins.

Educational Outreach Review

Based on studies and research, the emphasis for education will be for the voter to become familiar with completing the ballot. Candidates may also be provided educational information and would be encouraged to discuss the process as frequently as possible.

Efforts from the state program Utah Ranked Choice and other outside sources (FairVote, Ranked Choice Voting Resource Center) provide general material for use as educational resources. The State has also allocated funding for educational efforts during the Pilot Program. Additional opportunities through social media, web chats and clear information provided in the Voter Information guide will assist with education.

Coordination of a Ranked Choice Voting Election

As of the date of this memo, the Salt Lake County Clerk's office has indicated it cannot offer an option for Ranked Choice Voting until the new equipment is received in their office (January 2021) and testing is complete. No further outline on the potential ability to facilitate the RCV option or testing timeline was provided. *However, if H.B. 75 passes, Salt Lake County will be required by statute to conduct the election, the city may not contract out nor is it allowed to conduct the election on its own.*

In 2019, municipalities were provided the option to enter into an interlocal agreement with any local political subdivision in the State. It is anticipated there will be legislation to review this option for future elections during the 2021 legislative session. (State Code, 20A-5-400.1.c,d)

The City Recorder's office may conduct the municipal election with an automated voting system meeting the requirements listed in State Code <u>20A-5-302</u>. If it is determined the City Recorder conduct the process, it is anticipated an RFP may be needed for voting equipment.

Is the Council interested in reviewing a resolution for the participation in the Pilot Program?

Is City leadership interested in obtaining an estimate or draft interlocal agreement for further consideration of Ranked Choice/Instant Runoff Voting?



How to make your candidate choice


1. Pick your first choice candidate and completely fill in the oval next to that candidate under First Choice, like this:

- 3. Your third choice candidate, if you have one, works the same way.




If you make a mistake - or cross out or make a stray mark - ask for a new ballot. Otherwise your vote may not count.






- Rank candidates in order of your choice. You may rank as many or as few candidates as you choose.
