MANSELL, SALT LAKE CITY RECORDER, DO HEREBY CERTIFY that the following Local Opinion Question was originally found to be a legally sufficient initiative based on the number of legal signatures obtained, but was determined by the City to be invalid because the subject matter of the initiative, if passed, would not result in a city law.

The sponsors of the initiative, Move to Amend Salt Lake City, has now requested this matter be submitted to the legal voters of Salt Lake City as an Opinion Question in the time and manner so determined by the City Council and so declared by Resolution.

"WE THE PEOPLE AMENDMENT"

Artificial entities are not persons and can be regulated. The rights protected by the Constitution of the United States are the rights of natural persons only. Artificial entities established by the laws of any State, the United States, or any foreign state shall have no rights under this Constitution and are subject to regulation by the People, through Federal, State, or local law. The privileges of artificial entities shall be determined by the People, through Federal, State, or local law, and shall not be construed to be inherent or inalienable.

Money is not speech and can be regulated. Federal, State, and local government shall regulate, limit, or prohibit contributions and expenditures, including a candidate's own contributions and expenditures, to ensure that all citizens, regardless of their economic status, have access to the political process, and that no person gains, as a result of their money, substantially more access or ability to influence in any way the election of any candidate for public office or any ballot measure. Federal, State, and local government shall require that any permissible contributions and expenditures be publicly disclosed. The judiciary shall not construe the spending of money to influence elections to be speech under the 1st Amendment.

A Voter Information Pamphlet will be prepared to offer assistance in the Opinion Question; said pamphlet is not meant to persuade votes for or against. Move to Amend Salt Lake City, as the sponsor of the Opinion Question request, will be given the opportunity to provide a supporting statement not exceeding five hundred (500) words. Anyone wishing to provide an opposing statement, not exceeding five hundred (500) words, may submit the statement to the City Recorder, 451 South State Street, Suite #415, SLC, UT 84114 until 5:00 p.m. on May 31, 2013. If two or more opposing statements are received, the City Recorder will select an opposing statement, by drawing lots, for publication in the pamphlet.
